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PRESIDENT'S REPORT

This past week, I met with the Newark Teachers Union Executive Board and Building Representatives. To visualize some of the historic concepts our Negotiations Team will be introducing in our next contract, we watched the film <u>The Mayo Clinic: Faith, Hope, Science</u>. While providing the historic background of the founding of the world's greatest health organization, this documentary intertwines interviews with staff and patients describing how they operate and are able to maintain their status as a world leader in medical services as well as innovation.

Shakespeare wrote "All the World's a stage," and a stage is exactly how we envision a classroom. Like actors on a stage, teachers are surrounded by dozens of support staff behind the curtain watching and waiting to be of professional useful service. "The show must go on," and it does. **We say teaching and learning (T&L) must go on.** This will only happen when we seriously acknowledge that the needs of the students come first.

Imagine little Amina vomited in your classroom. You make a call to the Nurse and continue with your lesson. The Nurse is on her way to pick up Amina, and she has already alerted the Custodian. **T&L continues**. In another scenario: in the middle of testing, Johnny needs service. One call to the CST gets Johnny removed from the classroom and testing continues. **T&L continues**. **THAT'S DREAMLAND!**

We're not saying teachers aren't empathetic to the needs of Amina and Johnny; we're saying that currently the teacher in the first case is three communication levels away from action being taken and a return to instruction. In the second case which may involve a Crisis Team, the teacher is at least 5 degrees of separation from returning to testing. **THAT'S OUR CURRENT REALITY!**

These types of disruptions to teaching and learning occur thousands of times a day in dysfunctional school districts across America. Dysfunction has become normalized, and our minds and bodies are responding negatively in the form of increased mental and physical reactions that no normalized human can sustain.

There has got to be a better way and I believe we may have found it.

For decades, schools have been subject to annual federal testing requirements in reading, math and science. These tests have driven so much else of what happens in schools—with consequences like teaching to the test and crowding out art, music and anything that is not tested. These tests are inappropriately used for decisions about grade retention, graduation and teacher evaluation. And they rarely give educators useful information on how to support student learning, let alone foster joy, collaboration, creativity or problem-solving skills.

Now, a bill—authored by a public school educator—has been introduced that would reduce the number of federally mandated assessments schools must administer. Click here to ask your representative to support the More Teaching, Less Testing Act.

This bill would also quadruple funding for Title I to address the chronic underfunding of our public schools, expand and fund a program to allow states to develop better assessments, and prohibit states from using these tests as the sole or dominant factor in large-scale graderetention policies, teacher evaluations or high school graduation policies, or as the sole factor in school rating systems.

For too long, the focus on punitive statewide summative tests has taken up too much of the already limited time and resources in our schools, narrowed the curriculum to tested topics, and contributed to the teacher workforce shortage. The More Teaching, Less Testing Act is one step toward correcting this problem. Click here to ask your legislator to support it.
